Jarden Consumer Solutions to Donate \$180,000 to Charities in July

BOCA RATON, Fla. — July 8, 2008 — Jarden Consumer Solutions (JCS) announced today that its employee-funded JCS Community Fund has approved nearly \$180,000 in grants this July as part of its ongoing efforts to give back to the communities in which the Company's employees live and work.

“Our employees make possible the JCS Community Fund’s ability to continue investing in the improvement of our communities,” said Rocki Rockingham, JCS vice president, community relations and communications. “Over the past 18 months, the JCS Community Fund has donated nearly \$1 million to non-profit agencies. That is truly a testament to the generosity of our employees.”

The South Florida organizations and amounts for which the JCS Community Fund approved grants during the second quarter of 2008 are as follows:

- **Big Brothers Big Sisters of Greater Miami** received a \$5,000 grant to support the agency's School to Work Program in which at-risk youth receive work skills training.
- **Cross Road Food Bank**, a Fort Lauderdale-based agency that provides food to individuals and other feeding programs, received a \$20,000 grant to purchase 12 tractor-trailer loads of food.
- **Family of Humanity**, a Davie-based organization that provides after-school programs for at-risk youth, received \$5,000 to hire a reading specialist and purchase supplies to provide reading enrichment to the youth it serves.
- **Farmworkers' Children's Council** was awarded \$5,000 to support its Campo Alegre summer camp for the at-risk children of agricultural workers that it serves.
- **Florence Fuller Child Development Centers** was awarded a \$10,000 grant to support the agency's Mildly Ill program, which provides day care to children with a mild illness.

- **Gulfstream Goodwill Industries** received a \$10,000 grant to remodel a kitchen and dining area that will be used to help habilitate its vision-impaired clients.
- **The Haven**, a Boca Raton-based alternative home for young males, ages nine to 18, who have been placed in protective care, received a \$17,875 grant that will fund various aspects of the agency's Early Essentials for Work Readiness Program.
- **Milagro Center**, a Delray Beach-based organization that provides academic enrichment to at-risk youth, received a \$35,000 grant to support its STARS program, an arts-integrated education and academic skills curriculum.
- **The National Foundation for Teaching Entrepreneurship**, an agency that helps young people from low-income communities build skills and unlock their entrepreneurial creativity, received a \$5,000 grant to support its entrepreneurship education program for at-risk youth in Miami.
- **Pathways to Independence**, a Palm Beach Gardens-based organization that assists adults with severe physical developmental disabilities, received a \$7,100 grant to purchase a patient lift and transfer system for its therapy room.
- **Renaissance Village**, a West Palm Beach-based agency that assists young adults who have been discharged from the foster care system, was awarded a \$10,000 grant for its "Vita Nova" ("New Life") life-skills training programs for at-risk youth and young adults.

In addition to the grants issued in Florida, the JCS Community also provided donations to a number of charitable organizations in Mississippi (\$30,000) and Missouri (\$20,000).

The Jarden Consumer Solutions Community Fund is the Company's employee-funded charitable giving entity.
