



**Jarden Consumer Solutions Community Fund Donates  
\$125,275 to Charities in Second Quarter 2010**  
*Total donations surpass \$3 million since JCS Community Fund's creation in 2004*

Boca Raton, Fla. — July 22, 2010 — **Jarden Consumer Solutions** (JCS) announced today that its employee-funded **JCS Community Fund** approved \$125,275 in grants for the second quarter of 2010, as part of its ongoing efforts to give back to the communities where its employees live and work across the country.

“This quarter’s donations represent an important milestone for our organization as we surpassed **\$3 million** in total donations since the Community Fund’s creation in 2004,” said Rocki Rockingham, JCS vice president of community relations and communications.

“We are proud of our employees. Through their ongoing contributions, we’re able to implement a long-lasting impact, providing the fundamental services and opportunities that at-risk youth, women and families need to live happy and successful lives.”

The JCS Community Fund approved grants for the following South Florida organizations:

- **Feeding South Florida** (Pembroke Park), an organization dedicated to fighting hunger and poverty within the community, received \$30,000 to maintain the pick-up/delivery truck for the Extra Helpings program, which picks up excess foods from manufacturers, local hotels and restaurants and distributes it to at-risk individuals in low-income areas.
- **Milagro Foundation, Inc.** (Delray Beach), an organization committed to providing children with proper healthcare and education, received \$30,000 to support STARS, a program that incorporates six specialty programs that provide educational services to students of the Milagro Center.
- **Network Foundation for Teaching Entrepreneurship South Florida** (Miami), which helps young people from low-income communities build skills and unlock their entrepreneurial creativity, received \$5,000 to provide 50 Entrepreneurship Education scholarships to students who are part of the program, that come from hardworking families but do not have the necessary resources for student expenses.
- **Palm Beach Habilitation Center, Inc.** (Lake Worth), which provides a range of services to people with developmental, physical and/or emotional disabilities, received \$5,000 to support their daily meal program.
- **Palm Beach Medical Society Services** (West Palm Beach), an organization dedicated to improving the quality of and access to affordable health care for Palm Beach County residents, received \$10,000 to support Project Access, a program that provides medical



services to low-income Palm Beach County residents who are ineligible for other public-assistance programs.

- **The Haven, Inc.** (Boca Raton), a nationally accredited group home for boys ages 9-17, received \$12,275 to help fund the Early Essentials for Work Readiness Program, which helps young men transition out of foster care by teaching work-readiness skills and helping to secure affordable housing.
- **Wayne Barton Study Center** (Boca Raton), an organization that enhances the health, welfare and education of children within the community, received \$10,000 to help fund supplies and staffing for the Individualized Intensive Reading Program, which benefits students performing below a Level 2 on their FCAT reading test.
- **YMCA of Broward County** (Fort Lauderdale), an organization that teaches and encourages healthy life skills and values, received \$15,000 to provide 200 children in the summer camp program with scholarship assistance.

In addition to the grants issued in Florida, the JCS Community Fund also provided donations to charitable organizations in Mississippi and Missouri.

The JCS Community Fund approved a \$4,500 grant for the **Wayne County Library** in Waynesboro this quarter, to purchase HP touch-screen computers for the library's computer lab.

The JCS Community Fund approved grants for the following organizations in Missouri:

- **Crosslines Churches of the Joplin Area, Inc.** (Joplin), a group of people from local congregations who give back to the community in a variety of ways, received \$2,500 to help stock the food pantry, thereby assisting with daily operations.
- **National Inventors Hall of Fame** (Neosho), an organization that honors the men and women responsible for technological advances that lead human, social and economic progress, received \$1,000. The funds will be used to provide scholarships to underserved children in grades 1-6, allowing them to attend the weeklong, Neosho-based Camp Invention, a summer enrichment program that teaches life skills such as problem-solving and teamwork.

The Jarden Consumer Solutions Community Fund is the Company's employee-funded charitable giving entity. As a 501(c)(3) organization, the JCS Community Fund provides monetary grants to qualified charitable organizations that engage in community development initiatives (focusing on at-risk women, families and youth, and food programs) that serve the communities where
